

Day 3 Friday, June 26, 2015 A day in the Lagoon "The Islands of Venice" – Torcello, Burano and Murano

Venice is actually made up of 117 islands, so in that respect we will only see a few today. However, these three islands are each distinct and significant in their own right. Torcello holds claim as the start of the Venetian settlement in the lagoon. The local church houses some of the oldest art (mosaics and frescoes) in the area. Very few people actually live on the island today, so the feel of the island will be a strong contrast to St. Mark's Square when the cruise ships unload.

Burano is known for its brightly-colored homes and locally made lace. In fact, lace-making is an age-old tradition and is almost as famous for its quality as glassmaking on Murano. Burano is probably a good place to have lunch.

We will finish our tour of the islands on Murano with a visit to a local glass factory. If you wish to buy glass during your time in Venice today is probably your safest bet. Over the past 20 years, the economic situation in Venice has changed dramatically. This means that fewer and fewer Venetian are dealing in their native crafts; therefore, many of the stores on the main islands may not be dealing entirely in authentic Venetian glass. Buyer beware.

# Day 4 Saturday, June 27, 2015 Venice and Riese (and Bassano del Grappa - time permitting)

This morning you will have some time on your own to enjoy Venice. This afternoon we will head to the home of St. Pius X in the countryside. After our tour and Mass, we will board the bus and head to the town of Bassano del Grappa for a group dinner in the Dolomite region.

The neighborhood around our hotel is called Castello. This morning is a good opportunity to check out a few of the shops, have a nice lunch, or pop into a few historic places to enjoy the art. All of these places are a short walk away. \*\*\*Please know that you may go into any church to pray for free!

Church of San Zaccaria - the side altar has a famous painting by Bellini http://en.turismovenezia.it/Venezia/Chiesa-di-San-Zaccaria-6139.html

The Arsenale - this place inspired the Ford motor factory to develop its assembly line the museum is on the corner by the water and is worth a visit the contemporary (and controversial) art festival - La Biennale uses some of this space to display art <a href="http://www.labiennale.org/">http://www.labiennale.org/</a>

The Public Gardens (Il Giardini) - Want to get out of the heat a bit? This is a nice walk usually decorated with some outdoor sculptures from the Biennale. You will probably see a good number of cruise ships docked along the way.

San Giorgio Maggiore - Hop a vaporetto to the island across the way. Take a walk around the great Palladian church and then take the lift to the top for a beautiful panoramic view of Venice and the mountains in the distance.

#### Riese

This afternoon we will take a boat to a bus to the hometown of St. Pius X. We will take a guided tour of his birth home and museum. Following the visit we will attend Mass at his local church where his original tomb is located.

Dinner this evening will be held at a local restaurant in Riese.

Bassano del Grappa (subject to change due to travel restrictions)

There will be some time to stroll this small town with its famous covered bridge. If you are interested in ceramics, then this is a good place to do some window shopping. Perhaps you might want to sample some of the famous local beverage (Grappa) which shares its name with this Mountain. Technically speaking, when in Bassano we will be in the Alps - the Dolomitic Alps. On a clear day from the top of Mount Grappa, we could see Austria and Venice from the same vantage point.

Tonight, we will return to Venice by street light. Doesn't sound attractive? Maybe you are forgetting that the streets are made of water.

# Day 5 Sunday, June 28,2015 Venice

This morning we have the opportunity to worship at St. Mark's Basilica, or sleep in. If you sleep in, don't worry because we will meet our guide for a tour of St. Mark's and the Doge's Palace in the morning (time to be determined).

The afternoon is all yours. This is a fantastic time to get lost in Venice.

## Day 7

Tuesday, June 30, 2015

#### Assisi

This morning we will have a driving tour of Assisi and its surroundings. This afternoon we will have free time in Assisi with an optional walking tour of local sites. After dinner we will have an optional night tour up to the imposing fort, Rocca Maggiore, with an amazing view of the city below and Umbrian countryside.

# **Morning Driving Tour**

Church Santa Maria degli Angeli and the Porziuncola

The Porziuncola is a small chapel given to and cared for by St. Francis of Assisi. It was already at least 100 years old when St. Francis was alive which makes it nearly 1000 years today.

In the 1500s, the Italians began building the Basilica of Santa maria degli Angeli - now one of the largest churches in the world - over top of the Porziuncola to protect it and honor this sacred place.

## San Damiano

It is in this peaceful place that St. Francis received the challenge from Jesus to "go rebuild my church".

## Hermitage

The Eremo delle Carceri or Hermitage was built by St. Francis as a place for quiet retreat. He and his followers would go to this place for both silent, private prayer as well as communal gatherings.

Today the buildings of St. Francis' time are preserved as well as several trails for walks and hikes in the woods.

### **Cathedral of San Rufino**

The Cathedral of San Rufino is the church where St. Francis was baptized.

It is possible to visit the crypt. Also, it's possible - through glass installed in the nave floor - to see some of the crypt from the main church.

## Basilica of St. Clare (Santa Chiara)

The Basilica of Santa Chiara is easily distinguished by its pink and white stone and flying buttresses. In the crypt of the church, you can see the preserved body of St. Clare as well as a small museum which contains many items from the time of St. Francis and St. Clare.

# Church of Santa Maria sopra Minerva

Originally the Temple of Minerva from the 1st Century B.C., this building was converted into a church in the 1500s. It is adorned with high baroque appointments - so the beautiful inside of the church is not what you would expect based on the impressive, yet much older facade.
